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
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Sunshine Coast Disaster Management Strategic Framework

This plan forms part of the framework of Sunshine Coast local disaster management plans and should be read in conjunction with these Plans.



Introduction

Domestic animals form an integral part of community life for the residents of the Sunshine Coast.

The bond between domestic animals and their owners can be so strong that owners may be reluctant to leave their pet behind when being evacuated from their property. This can also be an indication that animal owners have inadequately planned for disasters.

Council's primary role for animal management during a disaster event is to ensure that domestic animals are coordinated in such a way that does not pose a risk to public health or safety. Approximately 5% of people in evacuation centres may arrive with their pets. In situations where an animal owner and their pet/s are evacuated, the owner shall maintain responsibility for the welfare of their animal/s.

In the event where people will not evacuate or delay evacuation in favour of their animals can seriously jeopardise the overall disaster management plan.

Purpose

The purpose of this plan is to detail the disaster management arrangements required to coordinate the response and recovery activities related to animal management within Council boundaries during a disaster event.

Sunshine Coast Council will provide the coordination of local animal management resources, and supportive care to domestic animals before, during and after a natural or man-made disaster.

Within Scope

This plan includes domestic animals (including animals domiciled on land used for farming) and livestock that are generally owned and/or kept by Sunshine Coast residents.

Outside Scope

This plan does not address emergency arrangements for native or introduced wildlife, marine animals or animals kept at theme parks or wildlife sanctuaries.

Activation of this Plan

Activation of this sub-plan will occur during the Stand-up response phase of a disaster event, which requires the opening and operation of an evacuation centre.

This plan will be activated by the Chair of the Local Disaster Management Group or authorised delegate.

Refer to Appendices A and B for the relevant contact information needed for activation.

Roles and Responsibilities

The following table outlines the roles and responsibilities of agencies and organisations involved in animal management activities during disaster events.

Planning Assumptions

The owners of household pets and livestock, when notified of an impending disaster, will take reasonable steps to shelter and provide for animals under their care and/or control. Owners of animals should make every effort to have all animals identified in accordance with the legislation which applies to the animal (e.g. registration, microchipping, ear tags, branding etc.) and to maintain records of this identification.

Sunshine Coast Council will plan for animal related emergency situations and implement response and recovery operations utilising local resources. State and commonwealth agencies, animal welfare organisations and businesses may provide animal care and rescue assistance during disasters, when requested.

Appropriate emergency planning and preparedness ensures the proper care and recovery of animals impacted during an emergency. This includes measures to identify housing and shelter for animals, establish methods of communicating information to the public, collect stray or lost animals, procure necessary supplies for the care of the animals, and plan for animal releases and return to owners. Regulated dogs or animals under a declaration proposal will be transferred and held at Council's Animal Pound facility.

Biosecurity Queensland is the lead agency with respect to animal disease outbreaks, such as Avian Influenza. For the purpose of this document Sunshine Coast Council may provide assistance, when requested to Biosecurity Queensland.

Zoos, wildlife shelters and circuses are responsible for their animals and should ensure that all efforts are made to ensure their safety.

Legal Considerations

Sunshine Coast Council recognises that certain legislation may be applicable during animal emergencies, including:

Animal Care and Protection Act 2001 – imposes a duty of care on persons in charge of animals and provides standards for the care and use of animals.

Animal Management (Cats and Dogs) Act 2008 – provides for the identification of cats (microchipping only) and dogs and the identification and registration of dogs and the effective management of regulated dogs.

Biosecurity Act 2014 – provides for how local governments need to deal with prohibited or restricted invasive animals (feral animals).

Sunshine Coast Council Local Government Area Biosecurity Plan 2017 – establishes a framework to support a cooperative and coordinated management approach that focuses available resources at the highest risk invasive plants and animals in order to deliver the most effective outcomes. This document informs of locally significant species that are required to be controlled.

Sunshine Coast Council (Animal Management) Local Law No. 2. 2011 and *Sunshine Coast Council (Animal Management) Subordinate Local Law No. 2 2011* – provides for the registration of cats and for the effective management of all domestic animals.

Work Health and Safety Act 2011 – principle objective of this legislation is to protect workers and other persons against harm to their health, safety and welfare.

Public Health Act 2005 – relevant objectives of this legislation include:

- i) preventing, controlling and reducing risks to public health; and
- ii) response to public health emergencies.

Food Act 2006 – provides provisions relating to the prohibition of animals in food preparation areas.

Sunshine Coast Animal Population

In 2013, the percentage of Queensland households with pets was 62% (Animal Health Alliance's *Pet Ownership in Australia* report).

In June 2018 there were 46,224 dogs and 9,405 cats registered with Council.

Concept of Operations

General

The primary and support agencies will manage and coordinate or assist local animal emergency planning and response activities. These agencies will use established animal protection and support organisations, processes, and procedures.

The sheltering, welfare, protection, and identification of domestic animals (including livestock) are the responsibility of their owners. In times of emergency or disaster, public interests and welfare may take precedence regarding sheltering, evacuating, and care of animals.

Owners are permitted to take their domestic animals to nominated evacuation centres or facilities for the temporary accommodation and shelter during disaster events. Owners are responsible for their animals at all times and must meet certain criteria. Refer to 'Sheltering of Domestic Pets' section below.

Domestic animals that stray and become incapable of being cared for by their owners, or a danger to themselves or the public will become the responsibility of Sunshine Coast Council. These animals may be impounded, cared for and, if possible, returned to their owners when appropriate. Where an animal is impounded an owner may be subject to certain conditions prior to the release of the animal such as payment of fees and registering their pet.

In the event animals cannot be returned to their owners, they will be managed in accordance with local laws and established animal management procedures. Those animal management procedures regarding holding periods may need to be extended to provide time to locate owners during a time of emergency or disaster.

During disaster events, Council's Local Disaster Coordination Centre (LDCC) may provide assistance to support animal management activities detailed within this plan.

Notification & Communications

Council's Response Services Unit will be responsible for the provision of animal management advice to the Local Disaster Management Group for dissemination to the community. Such information may include:

- Notifying the public to take their animals to friends or family to care for their animals who are not impacted by the event.
- Notifying the public of appropriate shelters to leave lost/stray animals, or animals that need immediate medical assistance.
- Information to the public to prepare their pets or livestock for an impending emergency.
- Promoting public awareness and providing information to animal owners regarding assistance following disaster events.

Suitable Evacuation Centres for Domestic Animals

The following key evacuation centres are equipped to temporarily accommodate domestic animals during disaster events. Refer to Appendix C for relevant equipment.

Suitable Locations for Livestock

The following locations are equipped to temporarily accommodate livestock during disaster events:

- Council's Sippy Creek Animal Pound Facility: 28 Sippy Creek Road, Tanawha QLD 4556
- Nambour Showgrounds: Showground Way, Nambour QLD 4560 (off Coronation Avenue)

Stray Animals - Livestock

Whilst livestock can generally fend for themselves, they may stray from the property where they are normally kept during disasters, and subsequently pose a safety hazard to the community. In these situations, Council's Response Services Unit will attempt to ascertain ownership of the animal/s and contact the relevant owner, requesting the animals be returned to their property.

In situations where ownership of the animal/s is not able to be determined, Council's Response Services Unit may attempt to contain herding livestock on adjoining properties in circumstances where there is adequate fencing to confine the animal/animals to the property and the property is not subjected to the nature of the emergency or disaster (e.g. officers should not place livestock onto a property if the entire property was under threat of flooding).

Where livestock cannot be placed onto an appropriate property, Council's Response Services Unit may decide to impound the animal/s and transport them to an impound facility.

Stray Animals - Domestic Pets

Depending upon the species straying and the type of emergency/disaster event, Council's Response Services Unit may take the following action:

- Contact the respective owner/s, if ownership can be established, and request them to collect and take custody of the straying animal/s.
- Impound the animal/s and return the animal/s to its/their owner.
- Impound the animal and transport such animal/s to an impound facility.

Sheltering of Trained Assistance Dogs

Trained assistance dogs, as well as dogs in training, will be permitted to stay inside evacuation centres with their owners. All certified dogs carry a tag and their owners will have identification for themselves and their dogs. These details will need to be included in the registration, although trained assistance dogs do not require separate animal registration. Proof of vaccination and other information is not required.

Sheltering of Livestock

Livestock such as pigs, fowls, goats, horses, cattle and sheep, require special arrangements by their owners in advance of any disaster situation. Livestock will not be accepted or held at evacuation centres. If livestock are temporarily held at an evacuation centre, arrangements will be made to transport the animal/s to an appropriate impound facility.

Sheltering of Domestic Pets

In the event a domestic animal is taken into an evacuation centre, a decision will be made by the evacuation centre manager in conjunction with the Local Disaster Coordination Centre, to ascertain whether the animal can be adequately housed and cared for at the evacuation centre. In addition, some animals will not be accepted due to the species of animal, behaviour, illness or need for specialised care. On these occasions, further assessments may be conducted, and alternative housing options identified.

Refer Appendix C for relevant equipment required at evacuation centres.

Refer Appendix D for the specific animal registration form needed at evacuation centres.

If owners are unable to take their domestic pet/s to an evacuation centre:

- Consider contacting family or friends outside the disaster zone to temporarily care for the animal/s
- Consider placing the animal in a boarding kennel, away from the emergency zone
- Consider housing the animal in a temporary foster home
- Consider Council Animal Pound facilities.

The following matters will be considered when a domestic pet is accepted at an evacuation centre:

Identification: Each animal is to be adequately identified as soon as possible after it has been brought to the centre. This includes details of microchip, council registration and specific collar identifiers. A register will be kept contained details of the animal and their owner.

Animal registration: A registration form (refer Appendix D) will need to be completed by the animal's owner. Details of each animal should include:

- Ownership
- Description of each animal, breed, sex
- Medical condition, pre-existing conditions
- Temperament assessment
- Immunisation

Preliminary health and behavioural assessment: Animal owners are to take all reasonable steps to ensure the animal/s current health condition and any behavioural issues are managed to avoid disruption to other people and animals at an evacuation facility.

Animal holding facilities: Appropriate facilities will be available to hold the animals until the emergency/disaster event has ended or the animals are transported to an impound facility. To reduce the threat of zoonosis (a disease which can be transmitted to humans from animals) and public safety, the animal holding area is to be a separate area and away from the area in which evacuated humans are being housed. It may be necessary to house animals outside Council's boundaries, should capacity be reached.

Where possible, animals should be separated by species, that is, cats in one area and dogs in another.

Animal owners are responsible for caring for their pet/s. It has been recognised that allowing animal owners to care for their pet can also facilitate the owner's recovery during a disaster.

Access to areas of the evacuation centre housing animals will be restricted to pet owners, their family members, relevant Council staff and veterinary personnel.

Food and water: It is recognised that pet food may not be ordinarily kept by Council, however through adequate planning, appropriate suppliers should be sourced, and contact details kept. In considering an area for housing pets during an emergency, preplanning should consider the availability of a clean and safe water supply.

Equipment: It is recognised that not all equipment/supplies may be ordinarily kept by Council, however every endeavor will be made to provide for animals presenting with their owners at an evacuation centre. Pet kits and foldable cages are held at key evacuation centres. The following limited equipment is available for use in an emergency/disaster. Refer Appendix C.

- Dog and cat cages
- Water bowls
- Food bowls
- Chain/rope to tether animals
- D shackles for securing
- Microchip readers
- Kitty litter and trays
- Bedding
- Disinfectant, buckets and mops
- Waste receptacles/bags
- Animal registration forms and stationery

Waste management: Pet owners are responsible for cleaning up after their pet/s.

Quarantine and infectious diseases: Where it is ascertained that evacuated animals may have an infectious condition, they will be quarantined to prevent the spread of disease to humans as well as other animals. This may require quarantine at a veterinary facility or Council Animal Pound. Transmission of infectious disease is a grave concern at shelters caring for stray animals. Many of these animals will be arriving unvaccinated, some inevitably incubating serious disease such as parvovirus and canine distemper in dogs.

Abandoned, sick or injured animals: Animals presented at an evacuation centre by persons who are not the owner of such animals will not be accepted by evacuation centre staff. In this instance, staff are to contact Customer Service to register a request for service, or alternatively contact Response Services at Appendix A. These will be referred to the Council Animal Pound or relevant agency.

Cleaning and maintenance of animal holding area: Pet areas should be cleaned and disinfected regularly to prevent infectious diseases. Because of its importance for animal health, cleaning should be approached systematically. Germs are moved about by human and animal traffic *throughout* any shelter. Additionally, germs are spread by hands, on doorknobs, clothing, goods, furniture and animal transport vehicles. Avoid contamination, apply sanitising procedures and restore facilities to pre-event condition.

Cleaning and maintenance of animal holding areas is to be carried out in accordance with the cleaning schedule (particularly for those situations where animals are to be held for an extended period (greater than 24 hours). Consider using a pressure water spray (e.g. Gerni) plus disinfectant. Refer to the Council Animal Pound Animal Cleaning Procedure or Response Services Unit staff for advice.

Requests for Assistance

Agencies may request assistance from Sunshine Coast Local Disaster Management Group for resources beyond the scope of their normal operations.

The local group is supported by the Local Disaster Coordination Centre, operated by Sunshine Coast Council.

Requests for assistance should be directed through the Local Disaster Coordination Centre Manager, particularly the Logistics Cell.

Equipment that may be needed are listed below under Resources.

When acquiring resources, the Local Disaster Coordination Centre will wherever possible:

- Source resources from within Council's resources before procuring from external supply
- Hire resources rather than purchase them, unless they are consumable items.

At the conclusion of operations, agencies will be required to return non-consumable resources as directed by the Local Disaster Coordination Centre for return or disposal, unless other arrangements have been made.

Council Animal Pound

Council's Animal Pound facility is located at: Sippy Creek Animal Pound, 48 Sippy Creek Road, Tanawha QLD 4556 (adjacent to the SCARS facility).

Animal capacity: 36 cats
 32 dogs
 Small and large livestock
 Poultry

Facilities and services:

- Veterinary Surgery room
- Regular stock of supplies and equipment
- Limited transport service
- Several satellite telephones
- Showers and toilets
- Landline telephones and desktop computers
- Small meeting room for up to 12 people
- Customer service counter

Note 1:

The Council Animal Pound is unable to house the following animals: fish, guinea pigs, snakes, mice, rats, aviary birds and animals prohibited to be kept as pets in Queensland (e.g. rabbits or wildlife).

Note 2:

Should the Animal Pound be impacted by flood water, staff have arrangements in place with RSPCA, SCARS, partner agencies and neighbouring councils.

Note 3:

For wildlife, contact WILVOS or Australia Zoo for assistance. Refer Appendix B.

Nambour Showgrounds

The Nambour Showgrounds comprises the following animal accommodation:

Stables

196 horse stables

Stables have internal lighting

A small supply of sawdust is kept on site, however additional supplies will be sought by Showgrounds staff, as required.

If necessary, horses may be housed within the cattle yards, up to two horses at a time.

Cattle Yards

15 cattle yards

There is lighting installed to the cattle yards, if required at night.

Animal Care

Livestock owners are responsible for their animals at all times. Where possible, owners are to comply with procedures and directions provided by Showgrounds staff.

Facilities and Services

- Two-way radio communications available
- Catering can be arranged with the local Apex and Rotary Clubs, as well as the Salvation Army MoU arrangements

Financial Arrangements

Costs incurred by Council during the temporary re-housing of domestic pets and/or livestock, will be reimbursed on a cost-recovery basis and/or subject to activation of disaster funding.

3. I understand that if the emergency poses a threat to the safety of my animal(s) and an additional relocation becomes necessary than this disclaimer will extend to such relocation.
