Eumundi, Doonan, Verrierdale and Weyba Downs (EDV) – Proposed boundary change request.

My fellow Councillors

For some time, we have all followed with interest the EDV Residents for Boundary Change Group ("the EDV Group"), which is seeking a change to the Sunshine Coast Council boundaries so that the area comprising Eumundi, Doonan, Verrierdale and Weyba Downs is incorporated into the Noosa Shire. These are our Sunshine Coast communities and our Sunshine Coast residents.

I have met with the executive members of the EDV Group, as have the Councillors for Divisions 9 and 10. In these meetings, the opportunity has been provided to the Group to outline their proposal and the merits (as they see it) of adjusting our Council boundaries in this way. I have also heard from concerned residents who want no part of this change and expect their elected representatives to support their position.

It is important to note that only the Minister for Local Government, Community Recovery and Resilience can propose to a Local Government Change Commission that a boundary adjustment be assessed as to whether the change is in the public interest.

In two conversations I have had with the Minister on this matter, he has advised me he will only refer the proposal by the EDV Group to a Change Commission if the proposal has the support of both the Noosa Shire and Sunshine Coast councils.

In mid-June, two open community meetings and a community information session were held by the EDV Group to discuss the proposal and received mixed support.

Councillors, I think it is important to look closely at a number of facts in relation to this area of the Sunshine Coast.

The area in question currently comprises 2,576 rateable properties and covers approximately 3.6% of the Sunshine Coast Council area.

Divisions 9 and 10 of the Sunshine Coast Council area would be affected by this change. According to 2011 Census data, there are 4,460 adults residing in the four identified suburbs. A portion of these adults are already within the Noosa Shire area (see Appendix A).

Preliminary financial estimates suggest the proposed boundary change (if implemented) would represent an impact on Council's operational budget of approximately \$4.48 million in lost revenue and approximately \$4 million in reduced costs. This of course, would vary from year to year, where sometimes expenses exceed receipts and vice versus for example, the construction of the Eumundi pool.

The area that is the subject of the proposed boundary change has always been part of the Sunshine Coast, and formerly the Maroochy, local government area. It has never been a part of the Noosa local government area. It has been serviced, supported and resourced by this Council and its predecessors since 1912, and we want them to remain a vital part of the Sunshine Coast community.

Furthermore - and contrary to what has been suggested by others - the area in question

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derives a significant benefit from the Sunshine Coast local government area and its core community connections are with this region.

A few brief examples demonstrate this clearly:

- I am advised that of the more than 3100 working residents in this area, it would appear that up to approximately 70% are employed in the Sunshine Coast Council area. The Sunshine Coast is the area that provides the majority of the employment options for the residents in this area – and this will likely increase as major investments in the Health and Medical precinct at Kawana, the Maroochydore city centre and the University precinct in Sippy Downs take shape.
- Since 2008, nearly 25% of land acquired by this Council using the Environmental Levy or over 252 hectares - is situated in the area in question. Council is also working closely with other levels of government to enhance the biodiversity values of the area and the land that Council has acquired.
- Through the encouragement and support of this Council, Ochre Health brought their investment to this region earlier in the form of the GP Super Clinic at Sippy Downs. This has led to the decision by Ochre Health to establish a medical practice in Eumundi which is unlikely to have occurred without Council's encouragement of this company's investment in the region. Council is also continuing to invest in improvements to the site of the Eumundi Markets to enhance the experience for patrons, market participants and the community.
- When the Pacific Pearl makes its stop-over at Mooloolaba next month, there will be several busloads of tourists that will visit Eumundi, providing a direct benefit for the Eumundi Markets and traders in the area. This stop-over (and others that are now planned) will bring great marketing exposure and associated tourism expenditure to the area which will have come about through the efforts of this Council and its partners.
- Air New Zealand flights have also introduced many new visitors.

The facts point to where the Eumundi, Doonan, Verrierdale and Weyba Downs communities derive their strength and future prosperity.

The EDV Group has not however, been able to provide a strong evidence base to support the proposed boundary change. This is despite the fact that the Group has, by their own admission, been working on this since 2004. This is borne out in the most recent briefing note from the EDV Group to Council, a copy of which has previously been circulated to Councillors (see Appendix B).

Councillors, in addition to the local considerations, I feel it is important to point out that so far, no one has produced a valid reason as to why the boundaries of the Sunshine Coast Council should continue to remain under the spotlight. This does not appear to be the case for other councils in Queensland.

This change proposal – on the back of the deamalgamation that occurred on 1 January this year – should not be supported for the following reasons:

- 1. It adds further disruption to our community <u>as a whole</u> after six years of upheaval generated by the 2008 amalgamation and the subsequent 2014 deamalgamation of local government in this area.
- 2. It potentially erodes business confidence in the region and undermines our ability to

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present the region as a stable and progressive location for new investment – investment that this region needs to generate employment, provide much needed infrastructure and the facilities and services that our residents need.

3. It is already creating division, instability and uncertainty within and between communities in the region – which in itself, poses one of the biggest challenges to community well-being and economic growth.

Councillors, as we know boundary changes have implications for the whole region – not just the areas that are seeking the change. Our Council needs to consider the interests not only of the EDV area, but also the interests of its ratepayers across the region as a whole.

The residents of the Sunshine Coast were not afforded the opportunity to have their say on the Noosa deamalgamation – and in all likelihood, they will not get an opportunity to have a say in the boundary change proposed by the EDV Group. Councillors, this is because there is no requirement for a Change Commission to conduct a referendum or plebiscite on any boundary change proposal that it may be asked to assess.

Quite simply Councillors, I believe the time has come to say enough is enough!

This region - and this Council - should be allowed to get on with the job of creating one of the best places in Australia to live, work, play and invest – without being constantly subject to the uncertainty and disruption that boundary changes produce.

Councillors I ask that you support this Mayoral Minute.

EDV Residents Group

Briefing Note for SCC Councillors

BACKGROUND

The EDV Residents Group was formed in January 2004 when there were three Councils in the region (Noosa, Maroochy and Caloundra) following two community meetings when residents expressed a strong preference to be part of Noosa Shire.

To establish if the feeling from those meetings translated into wider community support, the group firstly established what was needed to change a boundary by reviewing legislation and seeking expert advice. We determined that key component that would be considered in any boundary change determination was the need to demonstrate community of interest among other matters).

We undertook a survey to find out our "community of interest" – was it Noosa or Maroochy? – The results –demonstrated major links with Noosa that was further validated by hard data from other studies. We consulted widely on the recommended boundary which included all of Eumundi, Doonan, Verrierdale and Weyba Downs (part of which is now called Peregian Beach). See attached map. We approached our then local Councillor to discuss what we would need to do to demonstrate to Maroochy Council the level of community support – he demanded a letter from the majority of residents as proof. Accordingly, we door knocked every household in the area in late 2005 (over 2,500 homes) to establish if there was support for a boundary change to bring us into Noosa Shire.

What did we find - Over 80% of residents supported a boundary change as did 87% of local businesses.

We prepared a major submission for the Size, Shape and Sustainability Program in January 2006 (executive summary attached as a separate document). However, the forced amalgamations effectively ended the campaign.

THE PRESENT SITUATION

In 2014, we have been given a unique opportunity by the Minister for Local Government to revisit the issue. Since 2006, many people have moved away and others have come with no knowledge of the history. We needed to repeat the research and establish if our 2006 findings were applicable today **BUT** we needed to have independent people do this for us. We commissioned some initial research, again into community of interest, with a local community survey designed and implemented by a market research company. We also commissioned an independent analysis of factual data such as demographics to see if there was alignment.

This preliminary research, both survey and factual analysis showed very similar findings to that obtained in 2006 (i.e. strong community of interest links with Noosa Shire, far less so with the Sunshine Coast and 80% indicating support for a boundary change versus 13% against). This provided a base from which to undertake further community consultation.

These results were reported back to three community meetings and at those meetings a number of questions were asked. The questions in the main related to benefits for a change, rates, the opportunity for people to have a say and the survey results. These have all been distributed to those attendees who left their correct email address on registration. These meetings achieved a key objective – to restart the conversation in our community.

We have met with our two local councillors, with the Mayor and CEO of both Councils and with the Minister for Local Government at the recent community cabinet meeting. The intent of these meetings (which were informal) was to brief all interested parties on our activities and objective for a boundary change.

OUR NEXT STEPS

We are circulating more information to our community as requested over the next month and consulting more widely. Many of the reasons for a boundary change will be outlined on our new website which goes live on Friday week (25th July).

We intend to gather more factual information about community views and present a formal submission to both Councils in early September to enable each Council to deliberate on the implications of this request.
