In response to a question raised by Councillor Landsberg, please note the following additional information for your consideration.

Question: “Cultural burns - how many have we had?”

Response:

The Cultural Burning program received funding of \$100,000 from the Commonwealth Bushfire Recovery Grants in 2020.

At this stage, Cultural burns have not been specifically identified. Prior to cultural burning commencing on the Sunshine Coast, a program of capacity building is planned to ensure First Nations members have nationally accredited qualifications and have the opportunity to increase their skills base.

In July 2021, nominated Kabi Kabi and Jinibara representatives will be undertaking nationally accredited training in fire management (crew member).

A Firesticks Alliance cultural burning workshop is also planned for 2021 which will demonstrate a cultural burning approach for both First Nations People on the Sunshine Coast and for identified council staff (a cultural burn demonstration may accompany this workshop – weather dependant).

Question: “A history of what grants we have been successful with under the current RAP, and what we would hope to target in the coming RAP with extra resources?”

Response:

2021:

- Horizon Festival -Open Horizons – (Arts Queensland Open Air funding) - Although not 100% a First Nations Project, approximately 40% of the funding is directed to First Nations events and artists – Total Value \$32,000
- Horizon Festival – Final Call (Arts Queensland Showcase funding) - Although not 100% a First Nations Project, approximately 30% of the funding is directed to First Nations events and artists – Total Value \$10,000

2020:

- Commonwealth Bushfire Recovery Grant funding, with \$100,000 allocated toward Cultural Burning program

2019:

- Department of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnership Reconciliation Small Grants Program - \$2500

2018

- DATSIP Reconciliation Small Grants Program - \$2500
- Horizon Festival – Dawn Awakening (Arts Queensland Showcase funding) - \$16,130

Further support has been provided by the private sector for projects such as place making in Bli Bli and Landsborough.

Question: “Signage across the region - when is it replaced - end of life or other? What sort of program for replacement? Consistency – what’s on the signage and where it is located?”

Response:

A deliverable of the Sunshine Coast Innovate Reconciliation Action Plan under Action Item 8 is “Acknowledgement of Traditional Custodian signage on all Council administration buildings and community facility buildings”, and will be delivered by June 2022. Consultation has commenced with areas of council responsible for signage, with early conversations indicating that this will be done as part/integrated into the rolling program for signage replacement across the local government area. This consultation will result in a guideline that will ensure this work is undertaken with consistency.

Question:

Examples of community engagement to be provided – illustrated via the IAP2 Spectrum.

Response:

Council's community engagement approach is guided by the International Association for Public Participation (IAP2) framework, in recognition that IAP2 is a world-class leader in the engagement of communities. This includes the adoption of the IAP2 spectrum for community engagement, which provides a methodology for determining what level of influence a community has over a decision and therefore what level of engagement is appropriate. The spectrum operates on a scale of engagement from: Inform; Consult; Involve; Collaborate; and Empower.

- **Inform:** to provide the public with balanced and objective information to assist them in understanding the problems, alternatives, opportunities and or solutions.
- **Consult:** to obtain public feedback on relevant issues, alternatives and or decisions to be made.
- **Involve:** to work with the public throughout the process to ensure that public concerns and aspirations are consistently understood and considered.
- **Collaborate:** to partner with the public in each aspect of the decision including the development of alternatives and the identification of the preferred solution.
- **Empower:** to place final decision making in the hands of the public.

The following diagram illustrates examples of where some of council's past and future engagement programs may fit within the spectrum, and illustrates, as per the definition of community engagement stated in the Community Engagement Policy, that communication and the sharing of information underpins all community engagement activities. The Community Engagement Framework acknowledges that differing stakeholders may be engaged at distinct levels dependent on scope of influence and a project's lifecycle will assist in determining the appropriate level of engagement throughout. This diagram is a guide only and should not replace an appropriately considered and planned engagement determination process, as outlined within the Framework.

Question:

How engagement results are presented and reflected back to community to show how input has influenced decision-making, and examples of this.

Response:

There are a number of reasons for reporting on the outcomes from engagement activities and it can be done in a number of different ways. Some of the objectives for reporting on outcomes are:

- To communicate what has been learned from the iterative stages of the engagement process and to encourage further participation as the project progresses
- To communicate how input from the stakeholders and community has been considered in the final outcomes for the project
- To demonstrate transparency of the decision-making process
- To communicate the decision or outcome itself and how this will be implemented for the future.

Engagement results can be presented via a range of formats. For instance, Council officers typically provide a summary of the key matters raised within a community engagement program within an Ordinary Meeting agenda report pertaining to the project. Each report contains a 'Community engagement' section which outlines the details and outcomes of the community engagement program which has taken place. Information on past consultation activities can also be accessed via council's Have your Say site or via project pages on Council's corporate website. Council also releases quarterly reports which provide information on the implementation of council's corporate and operational plans. These quarterly reports keep the community informed on key projects happening within the region, and can provide information on recent community engagement programs. A range of communication methods can then be utilised to promote and/or circulate the information, e.g. direct email to respondents, media releases etc.

The development of the [Sunshine Coast Community Strategy 2019-2041](#) and articulation of its past consultation outline, and the more recent [Create Caloundra project](#), as detailed on Council's Have your Say site, offer helpful examples of effective approaches to reporting back to community on the community engagement process and associated outcomes.

The Community Engagement Policy and Framework will guide Council in undertaking best practice community engagement, with an important element of this being to 'close the loop' with our community on community engagement outcomes. As the Policy and Framework are implemented across council, the community will see greater information on the matters raised throughout a community engagement program, and how these issues have been responded to.

In particular, the Community Engagement Framework contains a Community Engagement Outcomes Report template to provide a consistent methodology for the reporting and evaluation of community engagement activities.
